




Central Idea

The songs/lullabies and books we expose children to generally reinforce the values and beliefs of the culture of which they are a part. "Over the Rainbow" by Harold Arlen is an inspirational song popularized by its inclusion in *The Wizard of Oz*. The birds referenced in the song represent the speaker's ideal/future self, and reinforce that that the reader should better themselves, so they can achieve their goals.

The birds have already perfected themselves, and are able to reach a wonderful land, where their dreams are possible. The speaker's focus on the birds demonstrate that they [the speaker] are envious of these creatures, wondering, "If happy little bluebirds fly/ Beyond the rainbow/ Why, oh why can't I?" This self-reflection will lead to personal discoveries and growth that will allow the speaker to evolve into the type of person necessary to reach their dreams. The inclusion of this song in my childhood was meant to foster values of imagination, and a desire not only to dream big, but to overcome any obstacles that interfere with my dreams.
